

Dear Friends,

It seems that if there was ever a time that we needed Ash Wednesday and Lent it is now. Ash Wednesday this year is February 17th with Easter coming on April 4, and Lent is everything in-between. Ash Wednesday is the day that we confess before God that we are sinners and in need of God's grace. If you can't feel that need for yourself as an individual, you can certainly feel it for humanity. Humanity is a mess and we need God – period. Lent is the time, 40 days, not including Sundays, when we determine to be and live closer to God and God's desires.

We have said it before – 2020 was a tough year. A year that for most of us we would gladly remove from our memories. We looked forward to a New Year and a new start and then the violence at the nation's capitol happened and we couldn't help but yell, "Come On! What next?"

My sermon on January 17th was titled Come and See. I think I could have easily made it, Come On, Come and See. The two Come Ons are very different, however. The one is a cry of desperation where we wonder when and if all this will ever end. The other Come On is the early disciples crying to their friends, Come On we have found the Messiah.

So as Lent approaches let us work on moving from an exclamation of Come On, what's next to an invitation of Come On, I've Found the Messiah. To help us in that effort I offer you two opportunities,

- 1. A Bible Study that explores the Book of John as it pertains to Jesus and his ministry. Books are available in the breezeway and in the church office. If you wish to contribute to the cost, that is \$16. We will meet in person, starting on Monday, February $15^{\rm th}$ at 6 pm.
- 2. An Ash Wednesday service will happen on February 17th at 7 pm. I don't know exactly what it will look like due to Covid, but we will have some sort of service. I really appreciate this service as it tends to be peopled by people who really want to be there I hope you are one of them.

I look forward to working through this Holy season with you as we strive to be the people God wants us to be. May we all find blessings in this new year.

This article originally run in last year's newsletter but bares repeating after the year we've had.

The Kind of Christian I Refuse to Be

I am a Christian.

Actually, it's more accurate lately to say that I am *still* a Christian.

I now say this with much trepidation. I say it with great fatigue. I say it somewhat begrudgingly. I say it with more than a good deal of embarrassment—not of Jesus, but of so many of his people and so much of the Church professing to speak for him.

Looking around at too much of what represents my faith tradition, it's become a daily battle to make this once effortless declaration, knowing that it now automatically aligns me with those who share so little in common with the Jesus I met when I first claimed the name *Christian*.

I know the kind of people making this declaration now aligns me with in people's minds. It now aligns me with bathroom bullies, politicized pulpits, white privilege, and overt racism; with bigotry toward so many groups of people who represent the "world" I grew up believing that *God so loved*.

There are things that used to be a given as a follower of Jesus, that no longer are.

For far too many people, being a Christian no longer means you need to be humble or forgiving. It no longer means you need a heart to serve or bring healing. It no longer requires compassion or mercy or benevolence. It no longer requires you to turn the other cheek or to love your enemies or to take the lowest place or to love your neighbor as yourself.

It no longer requires Jesus.

And so the choices are to abandon the idea of claiming Christ altogether to avoid being deemed *hateful by association* in the eyes of so much of the watching world—or to reclaim the name Christian so that it once again replicates the love of Jesus in the world.

I am trying to do the latter.

Yes, I am a Christian, but there is a Christian I refuse to be.

I refuse to be a Christian who lives in fear of people who look or speak or worship differently than I do.

I refuse to be a Christian who believes that God blesses America more than God so loves the world.

I refuse to be a Christian who can't find the beauty and truth

in religious traditions other than my own.

I refuse to be a Christian who uses the Bible to perpetuate individual or systemic bigotry, racism, or sexism.

I refuse to be a Christian who treasures allegiance to a flag or a country or a political party, above emulating Jesus.

I refuse to be a Christian who is reluctant to call-out the words of hateful preachers, venomous politicians, and mean-spirited pew sitters, in the name of keeping ceremonial Christian unity.

I refuse to be a Christian who tolerates a global Church where all people are not openly welcomed, fully celebrated, and equally cared for.

I refuse to be a Christian who speaks always with holy war rhetoric about an encroaching enemy horde that must be rallied against and defeated.

I refuse to be a Christian who is generous with damnation and stingy with Grace.

I refuse to be a Christian who can't see the image of God in people of every color, every religious tradition, every sexual orientation.

I refuse to be a Christian who demands that others believe what I believe or live as I live or profess what I profess.

I refuse to be a Christian who sees the world in a hopeless spiral downward and can only condemn it or withdraw from it.

I refuse to be a Christian devoid of the character of Jesus; his humility, his compassion, his smallness, his gentleness with people's wounds, his attention to the poor and the forgotten and the marginalized, his intolerance for religious hypocrisy, his clear expression of the love of God.

I refuse to be a Christian unless it means I live as a person of hospitality, of healing, of redemption, of justice, of expectation-defying Grace, of counterintuitive love. These are non-negotiables.

Yes, it is much more difficult to say it these days than it has ever been, but I still do say it.

I am still a Christian—but I refuse to be one without Jesus.

Mobile Pantry Distribution Changes

The Mobile Food Pantry is scheduled to be at First UMC Tipton on Friday, February 5, 3:30–4:30 pm. We are still following the procedures listed below because of the COVID-19 virus.

It reads in part: For the foreseeable future, we are making changes to our mobile pantry distribution to protect your health and the health of the clients.

- We will be distributing pre-boxed food rather than setting up tables for clients to "shop" from.
- Clients will be asked to wait in their vehicles and just drive thru for pick up. If clients do not have cars, ask that they social distance. Calling one person at a time up to receive their pre-boxed and bagged items.
- Check in should be done by one person, if they are new and need to sign a TEFAP form, please keep contact minimal. Gloves are available from HACAP to wear.

Audio System Operators Needed!

If you've ever been interested in learning about the church sound system and have some time to volunteer during the worship hour, we need sound board operators! I'm usually in church during Sundays when Chaos plays (2nd and 4th Sundays) to run the board so I'm looking for 2 or 3 people to potentially handle operation of the sound board on the other Sundays throughout the month. I can either do 'one on one' training sessions (Thursday nights during Chaos rehearsals) or I can schedule a time when everyone can attend at the same time. Contact me (bheil@ezrasoft.com) if you are

interested and please include times when you'd be available for training – I should be able to schedule any weeknight (expect for Wednesdays), or Sunday after church). A 24 channel sound board may look intimidating at first glance, but it's really not a hard job!

Volunteering for worship service duty typically involves turning on and off and adjusting the volume of specific audio channels (microphones) as needed. I'm usually around to power up the system, but in those cases where I'm not in church it would be necessary to be at the church 10–15 minutes before the service to power up the system, check microphone batteries, and work with the pastor or worship leader to coordinate any special audio needs.

I'm also interested in finding one or more people who would be available weekdays to operate the board during funerals.
